Membership

Membership numbers have remained strong. At the time of writing this report we had 91 entities as members. This included 14 businesses, 38 families, 35 individuals and 4 groups. We are particularly pleased to welcome community groups that have become Cittaslow members. These have included the Clayton Bay Community Association and Art @ Goolwa, who join the GADBUG bicycle Club and the Milang Old School House group. Business group numbers are increasing too.

Alexandrina Council

We welcome and appreciate the strong support provided by Mayor Keith Parkes, Councillors and staff from Alexandrina Council. This includes the regular use of meeting rooms, grants, and undertaking the process of creating a sister city relationship with Yaxi, in Gaochun County in the Jiangsu Province of China the first town in China to gain Cittaslow accreditation.

Thanks to Shaw Family Vintners (BallastStone) for looking after jam sales at Signal Point. This has provided a focus for Cittaslow and been important for the Community Garden's fund-raising.

Awards

Six individuals and groups received Cittaslow Goolwa Community Awards for 2015. The successful Awards Dinner is held each year since 2010 and are combined with SABA's Customer Service Awards. This last year Awards were made to the following:

- **Phillip Ball** for his involvement in the Aboriginal Youth Surf Life Saving program and **Nick Brauer** for sharing his surf board manufacturing skills with aboriginal children as part of the Aboriginal Youth Action Committee and displaying the boards at the Saltwater Surf ArtFest in Middleton
- **Andrew Barker** for his untiring efforts to create Grow Free and share his knowledge and passion for growing fruit and vegetables with others.

Nominations for 2016 Cittaslow Awards are now being called. Nominees don't have to be part of Cittaslow. We want to recognise the actions of individuals and groups whose activities support the principles of Cittaslow. The next Awards Dinner is expected to be held 14 April at the South Lakes Golf Club.

Challenges ahead

I would like to see more active **involvement** from more members from Cittaslow. The Food and Wine Group and the Community Garden are very active but it would be great to see more support for things like Cittaslow Sunday which will become International Cittaslow Week this year (last week in September).

We are seeking ideas for **Fundraising** now that we are no longer producing the Diary. The Food and Wine group have done well via the At The Wharf and Smoke Off activities and have contributed to Cittaslow's general administration costs. We want to keep membership costs to a minimum, however we have significant annual costs that we have to cover, particularly insurance. Your ideas are welcome. Come and share your ideas at the Cittaslow Management meetings which are held on the first Thursday of each month, at 7pm in Alexandrina Council Large Meeting Room.

Cittaslow International General Assembly – 10-12 May 2017

After a bit of messing about, we have finally settled on the dates. Delegates from the more than 200 member towns will be invited to arrive in Goolwa on Tuesday 9 May with official proceedings starting on Wednesday 10 May. Most mornings will be taken up with meetings, presentations and workshops with the afternoons spent travelling around our wonderful region. The official General Assembly will be on Friday 12 May. Each evening a different food experience will be provided.

A combined Alexandrina Council and Cittaslow Goolwa team have been working on this project for 2 years now. Specific working parties are now emerging to work on sections of this huge project. These

include catering, accommodation, tours, music, hospitality, transport, translation and event management. If you're interested in any of these, please let me know so that we can use your expertise.

Because of the distance, "all the way to Australia", we anticipate that the numbers will be down from those held in Europe. We are planning to host 100-125 delegates and officials. In the Netherlands in 2014 and in Abbiategrosso Italy last year, the promotional process began. It will be continued this year in Vizela Portugal by the Mayor Keith Parkes and his wife Tracy supported by several other Cittaslow Goolwa members. It is an honour for Goolwa to be granted the hosting of this event (the first time in the southern hemisphere, first English-speaking town and second time outside Europe) but it will be a huge challenge for us all. But I know we will be up to it – with your help!

This will be my last year as President of Cittaslow Goolwa. When we have our next AGM in November later this year, we will have someone else from our very capable group leading the Management Team.

10th Cittaslow International General Assembly

A combined Alexandrina Council and Cittaslow Goolwa Committee has been planning to host next year's Cittaslow International General Assembly 10-12 May 2017. Smaller specific task groups are now being created to undertake the detailed planning of the many aspects of this important event. They will report to the organising committee. Each year, one of the Cittaslow-accredited towns across the world is given the task to organise the AGM for this international organisation. With one exception, the General Assembly has always been held in Europe. On average, around 200 people have attended these Assemblies. In 2010, Korea hosted the event with all expenses, including delegates' travel being paid by the national government. Unfortunately that will not be the case for us. As well as organising the accommodation, travel and activities etc, we have to encourage Delegates to travel "all the way to Australia". We have to overcome their perceptions that it is easier for us to go to Europe than it is for Europeans to come to Australia. We began this process in the Netherlands in 2014 and Margaret Gardner continued it in Abbiategrosso Italy in 2015. This year a team led by Mayor Keith Parkes will put our case in Vizela in Portugal. We anticipate that maybe half the number of officials and delegates will come to Goolwa. A video is being prepared for Vizela to encourage delegates to "Come to Goolwa". Our website has been revamped in readiness for the Assembly.

We have a Food and Wine sub-committee who have agreed to coordinate the catering and food/drink aspect. We need volunteers to help with a range of activities both leading up to the event and actually at the Assembly. The transport section will cover getting guests from Adelaide to Goolwa, getting them to their accommodation, and travelling around on the various tours that are being planned. Tours will include experiencing the river and the Coorong, the Cockle Train, Australian animals, Ngarrinjjeri, art trails and produce trails. Entertainment during dinners will also need to be organised. Help with translation for both English and Italian will be needed. Accommodation in a town without a conference centre is a huge challenge. Would you be prepared to billet a delegate or two and transport them to functions when needed? Guides to help people get around town and perhaps assist those for whom English or Italian is not their native tongue will be a great help. Assistance with public relations and general media enquiries will also be sought. These are just a few of the tasks. Is there something that you think you might be able to do? Would you like some training as a Goolwa Ambassador to help prepare you for welcoming guests? I know that some of you have already sent me an email, but please fill in the Volunteer form which is at the back of this newsletter. WE NEED YOU!



FOOD & WINE ANNUAL REPORT

2015 has been a very successful year for the Group.

2014 could have been summed up as a series of meetings that involved a lot of discussion leading to the 2014 Smoke Off but not a lot else. In 2015, the Smoke Off was again held but this was but one of a variety of activities conducted by the group.

Meetings have been lively, industrious and a lot of fun. These have been held in a variety of venues including Bombora and Hectors on the Wharf. As in 2014, meetings were chaired by various group members and this has become part of the sense of purpose and high level of involvement of all within the Group.

Commencing in February, a series of How To events were conducted. These informative and entertaining sessions explored Goolwa Cockles (of course!) but also olives, cheese-making, bees and honey, foraging for mushrooms and most surprisingly for many, the secrets of preparing tasty dishes based on carp! These popular sessions were conducted at the Goolwa RSL, at Bombora and at the Goolwa Fish Cafe.

Another initiative was a series of seasonal dinners. These well-attended events celebrated not only the seasons but Cittaslow member food providers and top quality local produce. The dinners were held at Rankines at the Whistle Stop, Cafe Lime and Hectors on the Wharf. More will be held in 2016.

At The Wharf, an initial trial series of Friday night events has provided a venue for local music, food and wine (from Ballast Stone) as well as valuable income for Cittaslow Goolwa. At The Wharf has featured a variety of local food providers and has been a very well supported Cittaslow initiative with more to come in 2016.

The 2015 Smoke Off was conducted as part of At The Wharf – Wood Wine and Song. This new major event involved several leading Langhorne Creek wineries (with Ballast Stone) and local food providers and the increasingly popular local band, the MacTones. The Remembrance Garden was buzzing all day. All in all, the event was very well attended and a great deal of support for something similar in 2016 is already evident – November the 6th is the date.

There has been a greater emphasis on generating publicity about group activities in local media, particularly the Victor Harbor Times and local community radio station Alex-FM. In addition to the forgoing, the Food and Wine Group has been instrumental in forging relations with other community



groups including the Clayton Bay Community Association, the Goolwa Lions Club, the Goolwa Wharf Market and the Port Elliot and Strathalbyn annual shows.

The successes of 2016 really rely on the ongoing involvement of all members of Food and Wine. The Group continues to operate in a collaborative fashion with contributions from all concerned.

- November 27 +\$355 (less profit this time due to set up costs including 6 dozen glasses, 25 platters, glass jars, dip ingredients. Approximately \$75 was made from sale of platters. There should be a clear profit next event)
- January 29 CANCELLED so we lost -- (\$79) for liquor licence and (\$128) beer (will be recouped)
- Good infrastructure in place ie. Volunteers, set up and pack up routine, advertising (posters, print media, internet).
- Fantastic community response/attendance/support/anticipation.

Weaknesses

- There is an arrangement with Leah Grace that we can move the event inside if weather is inclement. Unfortunately we could not take this option Friday 29 January due to an exhibition in place at Signal Point.
- A wet weather policy was discussed but not formulated at Food and Wine Meeting February 2.

Opportunities

- Platters are a great way to incorporate Community Garden people/produce and promote the slow-food concept.
- Suggestion of Cittaslow tablecloths and other items to promote our 'brand' was discussed at Food and Wine meeting February 2 and a motion raised.

CITTASLOW COMMUNITY GARDEN REPORT

During 2015 approx. 20 garden beds were being leased by members of the community some of whom became general garden volunteers assisting with picking, composting and other general maintenance duties.

An additional small shed was constructed at the rear of the garden for the storage of tools and fertilizers. An additional enclosed garden bed was also constructed in this area.

The community garden continues to supply produce to the Goolwa Child Care Centre as part of a Goolwa & District Community Bank initiative. This is in its 3rd year of operation and brings in approx. \$100/month.

The community garden supplied some produce to the Food & Wine Group for the dips being sold at the 'At The Wharf Event'. We are hoping to continue to help with this when we have produce available.

The community garden continues to receive support from The Shaw Family at Signal Point. The income from produce sold there has been a great boost to our finances. However, it does require considerable time and effort from some volunteers to whom we are very grateful.

The community garden helped establish some raised beds at Create & Connect and supplied vegetable seedlings to get them started.

Some of the garden volunteers continued to help raise funds at the Stratco sausage sizzle. This used to happen on both Saturday and Sunday and the community garden had about 8 or 9 slots. However this has been reduced to about 3 or 4 times during the year. We are very grateful for their continuing support.

The balance at bank at 31st December 2015 was \$5,107.34 and we are expecting a water bill for approx. \$1,200. There is still some finishing off to do in the main shed which we should be able to pay from existing funds.



Volunteer numbers continue to fluctuate depending on the time of year which does determine how much we can achieve. However, we are looking forward to 2016 and will be discussing our ideas and plans for the future of the garden.

We finished 2015 with a great Christmas BBQ at the garden, about 18 people attended and we had lots of good food, wine and laughter.
