RETIRING PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT



After nearly ten years as President of Cittaslow Goolwa, it is with satisfaction that I look back but also with excitement as I look forward. Since our accreditation on 12 March 2007, we have achieved a lot. We have grown as an organisation just as the international administration has matured. We have created a depth of experience, knowledge and capability that embraces the whole community of Goolwa and surrounding areas. Our actual membership (currently 130 entities – individuals, couples, families, businesses and organisations) has grown but many more in the community acknowledge the value of being Cittaslow and strive, in their own way, to follow the Cittaslow ideas. Of greater importance is that the brand name "Cittaslow" is now well recognised but we need to do more work on understanding what it means.

In the short time since the last AGM, our activity base has broadened. As you'll see from the Food and Wine Report, their varied activities have been well received by Cittaslow members and the wider community. The Community Garden has consolidated its position and reached the limits of its available land. They have continued to contribute to the OPAL program with support for the Goolwa Children's Centre thanks to financial assistance from the Goolwa and District Community Bank (Bendigo). It was a delight to be able to entertain Costa Georgiadis of ABC TV Gardening fame - or should I say, have him entertain us!

The Cittaslow Farmers Market has finally opened after first being considered back in July 2006 – even before our accreditation! The Goolwa Fruit Forest has now begun to move forward after a short lapse. I am encouraged by the continued growth of Goolwa Tourism 5214 which is supported by the Southern Alexandrina Business Association.

We recognised the outstanding contributions by various people to the community by presenting Cittaslow Awards to Simon Ardill (seeds and gardening), Debbie Drew and Mal Russell (children and the Variety Bash), Patsy Greer (Port Elliot Show Committee), Jan Henderson (community service), Goolwa Pipi Co. (Hoad family), Debbie Smith (radio and food and wine organisation), Jules Wagner and Michael Buddle (Goolwa and South Coast Facebookers), Libby Wall and Erica Harris (the Arts, especially yarn bombing and remembrance poppies project).

Progress has been disappointingly slow for the establishment of the Cittaslow Centre in the old Council Chamber building. The location is perfect but the size and amenities of the building are providing obstacles for development.

We have held 4 Cittaslow Information sessions with a dozen people gaining more understanding about how Goolwa became a Cittaslow, what it means to be a Cittaslow and what we have achieved since accreditation. If there is interest, there will be more sessions. Members have shown their pride in being involved with Cittaslow by purchasing and wearing Cittaslow items like hats, jackets, t-shirts and name badges. Thanks to Jan and Debbie who have worked with Goolwa Image Makers to make this possible.

We've supported the project for the Mount Lofty Ranges World Heritage bid which covers our area as well. We were also involved in the Enquiry by Design workshop which was a planning exercise for Goolwa North growth.

Members of Cittaslow have regularly assisted with the Lions Auctions which have raised important funds for community and other projects. Thanks to all who volunteered and to Ken Smith for coordinating this participation on behalf of Cittaslow.

We have been active on the national level with four Goolwa members being part of the Board of Cittaslow Australasia. Six Goolwa members took to the international stage by attending the 9th Cittaslow International General Assembly in Vizela, Portugal. *Continued.....*

PRESIDENT'S REPORT (continued)

We are now well through our planning for the next Cittaslow International General Assembly 9-12 May 2017. So far we have received financial assistance from the Alexandria Council, the Lions Club of Goolwa and the Department of Primary Industries and Regional SA. Volunteers are stepping forward offering help with this challenging project and homes are being opened for billeting. Language classes in Italian are being conducted by Jacqui Showell and translation assistance has been received from Andrew Panozzo from Investigator College. Activities supporting the Assembly are being undertaken by students from Goolwa Primary School, Investigator College and Victor Harbor High School, including the Flexible Learning Options group.

None of this report would have been possible without the support of the Alexandria Council, the businesses of Goolwa, especially SABA and the community of our unique town. I especially thank each of you, especially the members of the Management team for your support, inspiration and encouragement and am confident that Cittaslow in Goolwa will be in good hands.

FOOD AND WINE GROUP ANNUAL REPORT



The year has been another successful one for the group - if anything, this year has been even more successful than 2015.

The ethos of the group continues. This is based around full involvement of all members with plenty of opportunities to contribute, not only at the many events that the group has conducted but, maybe more importantly, through decision-making at the regular monthly meetings. The serious work of the group is under-pinned by the fact that the meetings are lively and energetic and, frankly, a lot of fun. This year, as last, meetings were held at a variety of venues and chaired

by various members who took the opportunity to do so. Meetings consistently see attendances of fifteen to twenty and, as most are keen to have their say; this can make things a little chaotic at times but is always worthwhile.

Highlights of the year have included the continuing introduction of new members to group meetings, the return of some familiar faces and the success that the group has had in signing up more and more local food and wine businesses to the membership.

The At The Wharf events have been increasingly successful. There is a lot of hard work involved, co-ordinated by Karen Ross, and it is gratifying that so many come forward as volunteers to assist with what, at times, can be hard work. Numbers attending these events, with positive media attention, continue to increase. The Goolwa wharf precinct has an air of liveliness and good fun now and all the signs are that this will continue in the future.

The seasonal dinners were again well-received although, unfortunately, the poor weather caused the cancellation of the proposed Hangi – hopefully next year.

The How To program was over-taken by the hive of activity later in the year but will return in 2017. Highlight of this program was the passata day (thanks to Debbie for the organisation, various Trimboli family members and so many others) - this will return around February. Visits to Simon Ardill's Goolwa garden and Currency Creek orchard and the Hindmarsh Valley Dairy and Victor Harbor winery were greatly appreciated by those able to be involved. Two attempts at mushroom foraging also fell foul to the weather but a small group learnt all they needed to know about coffee at the Booths.

If anything, the future threatens to be even more lively than this year. The Smoke Off is upon us and Food and Wine Group members are actively involved in planning for the International Assembly, the tenth anniversary of Cittaslow Goolwa, the recently started Farmers Market and much more.

It would be remiss to not mention the great support from the Management Committee, the Alexandrina Council, Shaw Family Vintners, so many local food and wine vendors and members generally. Bendigo Bank continue with their support which enables the garden to continue to provide a box of fruit and veg every week.

Considering the appalling weather we have had during the winter the garden and buildings have survived remarkably well. That is with the exception of the seed raising enclosure which unfortunately was damaged during one of the many storms and this has now joined the list of things to do.

Some of the 24 leased beds changed hands during the year which created new members to Cittaslow however, out of these 24 beds only 4 people choose to come to the garden on Wednesday. This unfortunately means that a lot of the hard work associated with keeping the garden going is left to a few of the regulars.

GOOLWA LIONS AUCTIONS

Cittaslow Goolwa encourages all of you to help at least once a year. The Goolwa Lions holds an auction almost every month at the Goolwa Oval. Different groups help with the setting out of the items prior to the sale on a Saturday morning, Cittaslow has the task to help in the clean up stage. This includes taking down tents, putting away the catering stuff and loading any left over items onto the truck. This regular Lions activity raises substantial funds that are ploughed back into the community (including to Cittaslow) as well as supporting the many worthwhile Lions projects.

USE OF OLD COUNCIL CHAMBER BY CITTASLOW

Despite substantial delays, negotiations are progressing regarding Cittaslow Goolwa using the building at the corner of Cadell Street and Goolwa Terrace as a headquarters for our organisation. It is hoped that we will receive the key before the New Year. As this is a heritage building, we are limited with what can be done to the building and what fixtures we can use. The building was the early Goolwa Council Chamber. According to the Fact Sheet issued by the Department of Environment & Natural Resources, it states that a significant feature of the Goolwa state heritage precinct includes *the Council Chambers in Cadell Street which incorporated the original Town Hall (1860) and which were modernised in 1878 and 1907*. I have also seen a picture showing it as the Library.



A Development Application is currently in the hands of Council, along with assessment from the heritage advisor. At the December Management Meeting, there was considerable discussion regarding the 'name' for the building. This is not a sign that will appear on the building but a reference for when we talk about it. (ie. "I'll meet you at the Cittaslow....") Suggestions included "Cittaslow Chamber", "Cittaslow Corner", "Cittaslow Centre", "Cittaslow Central". What do you think? Let members of the Management Team know or come along to the February meeting. This will be your building and we will need your help to look after it.

REPORT FROM GADBUG

Extracts from the GADBUG newsletter:

On **Wednesday, 26/10/16**, we had fourteen riders gather under the Hindmarsh Island bridge by the wharf for our GAD-BUG ride. They were under the bridge to escape the light drizzle which had just started & continued on and off during the 1st half of the ride. ...we departed along the bikeway. We turned onto Kingdom Place heading for Beach Rd and were already strung out. ... From Boetcher we rode via Morrison Ave & Padman Cr to Mill Tce where we rejoined the bikeway. In Victor we gathered at Cafe Bavaria for coffee ... We departed in groups back to Goolwa ... going via Swains Crossing, Greenhill, Waterport & Beyond while I believe the others went direct. The weather had warmed up a bit and we had a pleasant ride back to Goolwa.



Fast Friday Ride to Finniss.



Friday was a great day for riding with bright sunshine & very gentle breezes. At the wharf we had twelve riders.

All had come for the Clayton ride ... We started well and rode out to the Clayton/Finniss Rd keeping together nicely at an easy pace. Both fords were dry with no water flowing over but the Tookayerta ford by the Currency Creek Winery was in poor repair with a large steel plate in the middle covering just some of the holes. ... At

Clayton we regrouped and set off around the picturesque peninsula before heading back up to Finniss...At the Finniss General Store they had a special on with two scones & a cup of coffee for \$7.50. We ordered our scones & coffee, sitting out in the pleasant outdoor eating area there. The coffee may have been a touch slow but the scones were great & huge. I was forced to do my best helping several riders unable to eat all of their scones. With much fuller tummies we set off back to Goolwa. On the climb out of the Finniss we separated again into two groups for the run back to Goolwa. [Some] took the Airport Rd turnoff while everyone else rode direct back to Goolwa...

Sunday was clear and sunny at the ride start time but we had a strong WNW wind of 35kph gusting to 54kph which steadily increased during the morning to reach 52kph gusting to 76kph at 11am. Considering the conditions we had a very good turnout of some sixteen riders at the wharf for the 8:30am photo. Later on we found [others] making some nineteen riders in all. We set off trying to avoid the wind on a slow tour of Goolwa South & Goolwa Beach before taking the bikeway into Tokuremoar Reserve to inspect the water level... The bike track certainly was wet while the lake in the reserve as you entered looked great. Still a lot of water needs to drain away. We then headed over to the Goolwa Barrage rather than No 19 as not as far to ride back into the wind. We split here with the strong boys going on to No19 while the rest of us headed back into the wind for the Heritage bakery and coffee. We had quite a crowd at the bakery with eventually 3 tables of GadBugs chatting and enjoying their coffee. The wind certainly wasn't the best but some riding proved very possible on a very windy Sunday.
